We knew she was hurt, but didn't know how badly. We immediately started a search party, spreading out around the property. But it was like looking for a needle in a haystack, since she had only been here for a few hours, it wasn't her home and there are a lot of coyotes out here. Hours of searching by foot and quad was to no avail.

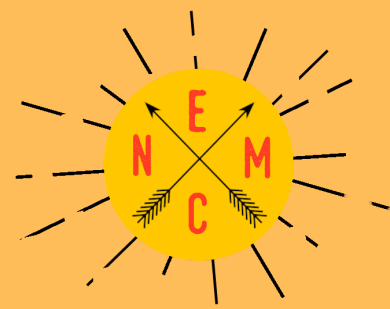
So we did what we always do when we are faced with difficult things. We prayed. We prayed together for this little dog to come back even though there seemed to be little hope. But we know God can do anything! A few days went by. God brought someone to the back of the property randomly at exactly the right time to see Molly, just sitting on the edge of the trees. They quickly called for Mary, who came running. Barefoot, she ran through slough water to grab Molly and bring her to safety! Imagine the joy for us to see this dog safe. She was taken to the vet and fixed up and for the rest of her time at ENMC she was treated like a little queen!

This reminded us of the parable of the lost sheep in Luke 15: 3-7 and was such a perfect example of ministry. A lot of effort is put into the search for God's lost sheep through programs, visits, and many other things. It can feel ineffective at times. But this drives us to pray, especially since we know that it is only by the Spirit of God that souls will be saved. When we see someone trusting and believing in Jesus as their Saviour, we praise God!

Seeing them allow God to be the Lord of their life is something to be celebrated! And we take no credit for it. We only trust that by being faithful God will accomplish the work He wants to do through us.

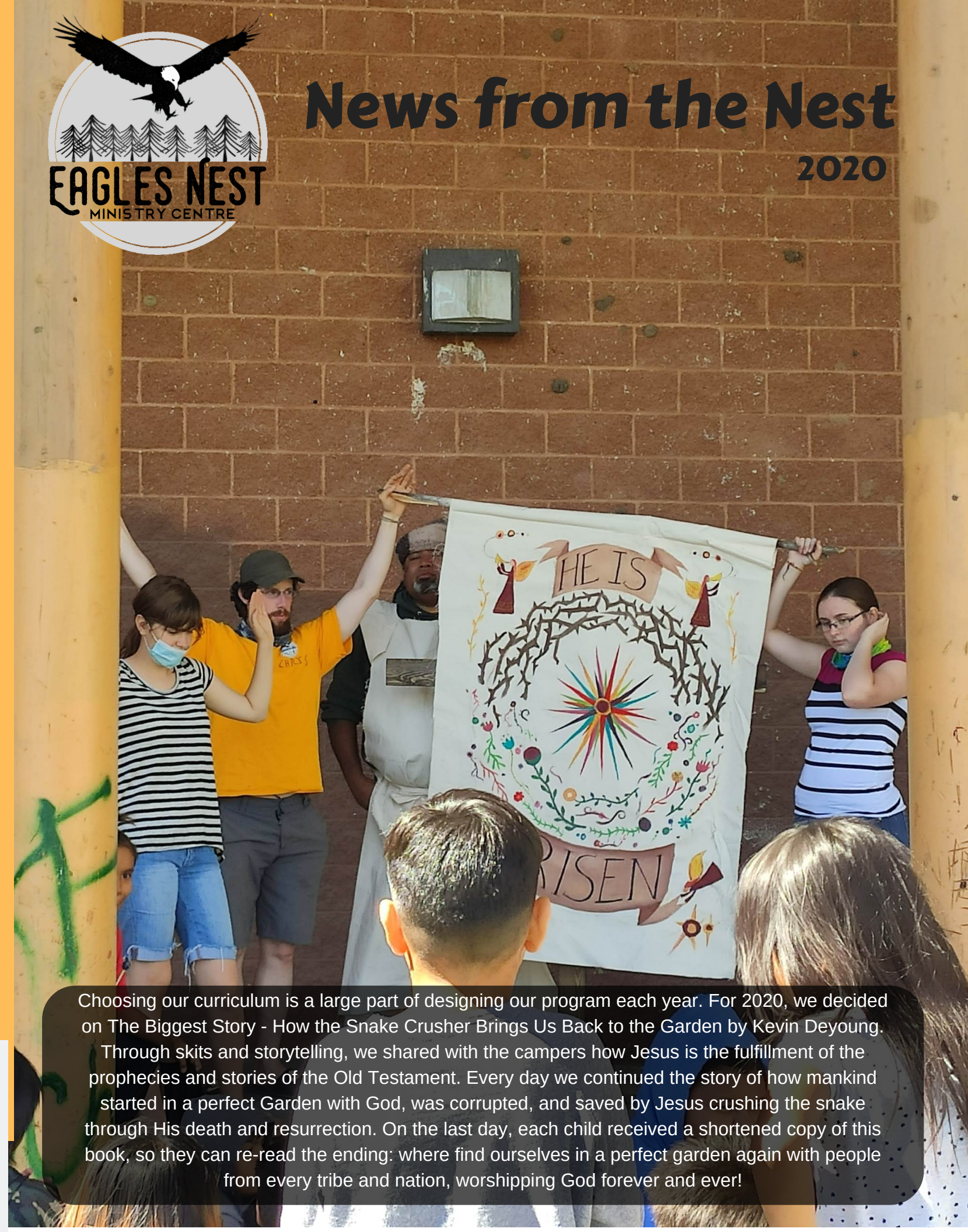

Choosing our curriculum is a large part of designing our program each year. For 2020, we decided on The Biggest Story - How the Snake Crusher Brings Us Back to the Garden by Kevin Deyoung.

Through skits and storytelling, we shared with the campers how Jesus is the fulfillment of the prophecies and stories of the Old Testament. Every day we continued the story of how mankind started in a perfect Garden with God, was corrupted, and saved by Jesus crushing the snake through His death and resurrection. On the last day, each child received a shortened copy of this book, so they can re-read the ending: where find ourselves in a perfect garden again with people from every tribe and nation, worshipping God forever and ever!

Overview of 2020 at Eagle's Nest!

This year our desire was to provide a summer camp program for the missionaries and the communities even if it had to be revised. We were unable to have overnight camps so we brought the camp to the kids! We were allowed into North and South Tall Cree and Fort Vermilion. We went to each community for 3 days for the afternoon, where we sang, taught the gospel, did crafts and played games!

We still wanted to give families the opportunity to come to the camp, so we opened up the camp for a week, setting aside different days for a specific community to come do the activities, eat food and go through our yard sale. By God's grace we were able to do this despite the many restrictions we have faced this year. Although there were many things that we couldn't continue this year due to Covid-19, there was never a lack of things to do! We have prayed, hosted weekly Bible Studies, hosted monthly gospel meetings with Nitaspeyimon Ministries, and done a lot of maintenance work around the camp.



Who are the Tallcree people?

Located in northern Alberta, near Fort Vermilion, is the Anishinabe Tallcree First Nation. There are 7 Reserves which make up this First Nation that covers an area of 9,387 total hectares or 23,195 total acres. Total population is 1,044, with most (547) living away from the Reserves, while 493 live on-reserve, and 4 live on crown land. Many can trace their origins back to Montana, where they originally lived but were driven out by the whites, after the 1868-1886 war. Ogimak Big Bear or Sitting Bull led them up to Canada.
